




Learn how to evaluate sources of information.

Step 1 — Look at Domain Extension




The web site end with .edu (meaning top level domain for education), .gov (meaning top level domain for government) can usually be trusted

Step 2 — Look at The Date and Author Published




- See if there is an author.
- See if there is a date shown.

Step 3 — Look at The Advertisement



- Look at advertisement.
- (i) If there are no advertisement, it's trustful. If there is only few advertisement, it's a little doubt. If there are many advertisement and annoying you, it's completely doubt.

Step 4 — Look at The Sponsor



 It is trustful if it's sponsored by big company, but it's not really believable with the support of unknown company.
